Now, John wrote this under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit of God. As John wrote he was controlled by the Holy Spirit of God when he said that Jesus created every single thing that has ever been brought into existence.

With that in mind turn back to Rev. 3:14. John also wrote the book of Revelation. He wrote it about 95 A.D. Notice what we read: "And unto the angel of the church of the Laodiceans write." Jesus is telling John the Apostle here what to write to the angel of the church of the Laodiceans. Since Jesus is telling John what to write, if, when He says He is the beginning of the creation of God that means He is a created being, then John is being told by Jesus, the Second Person of the holy Trinity, to write to the angel of the Laodiceans and to tell the angel of the church of the Laodiceans that He is the beginning of the creation of God, that He is the first thing that God created. You would have Jesus telling John to write something that would contradict what the Holy Spirit had previously told John to write in his gospel, in John 1:3.

In John 1:3, John wrote under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit of God, and he said that Jesus is the Creator of everything, that there is nothing in existence apart from Jesus Christ, which means that Jesus could not be a created being. Now, if Jesus here is telling to write unto the angel of the church of the Laodiceans that He is a created being, then He is telling Gohn to write here that which would contradict what the Holy Spirit had previously told John to write in his gospel. And the Persons of the Trinity simply do not contradict one another! Jesus, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity is never going to say anything that would contradict what the Holy Spirit has caused anybody else to write in the Word of God. The Persons of the Trinity are always in complete agreement. If Rev. 3:14 means means that Jesus is a created being, then John is being told by Jesus to write unto the angel of the church of the Laodiceans and to tell them
